Cosi Rehearsals are Rockin'

Director and CTC Vice President Ron Moore (who directed 'Good Grief' in our New Blood Festival in 2012) is leading a fantastic cast of CTC actors in the rehearsal of our next production 'Cosi' by Louis Nowra. The play is semiautobiographical, set in the early 70s against the backdrop of the Vietnam War. A young, inexperienced director is hired to put on a play in a psychiatric hospital, to be performed by the patients. It's a great comedy about the thrills and spills of producing theatre against the odds, something we know all about at the CTC! The Cosi cast took it's time to arrive, with a few actors dropping out in the first couple of weeks, but now we have a wonderful cast with a spectacular age range from 18 to...well, I won't be specific, but it has an 8 in it too.

Ron is being assisted by the very capable Rob Jorritsma, who is new the CTC. Rob has taught at the Castlemaine Steiner School for many years, and produced plays with the students, as well as with the parents, under the guise of the 'Waldorf Players' who performed out at the Guildford Music Hall. We also welcome newcomer Gus Saunders who will be stage managing Cosi. Gus has just moved to Castlemaine and is itching to get involved! For which we are very grateful.

The Cosi cast includes CTC veterans Morgan Kurrajong (Let's Kill Agatha Christie, The Republic of Trees for the CSF 2013), Michael Gillies Smith (Good Grief), David Watson (1984, Lucky Stiff for 3AC), Thomas Jones (our youngest veteran who appeared in The Hypochondriac in 2011) and newcomers Lloyd Dodsworth, Eleanor Barkla, April Garreffa (not strictly speaking a newcomer, but it's been a while!) Mike Smythe, and Nikki Sutterley, who crewed for us on Playhouse Creatures and appeared with the Improvables at Vinyl Vera's last year.

Here are some reflections from Mike Smythe who plays Henry:

"Rehearsals began on Monday 19 January, and are fast approaching the "scripts down" stage before performances begin in early April. I found it disconcerting in the early weeks to see a significant number of cast changes as people dropped in and out – but we have settled down to the nine stalwarts you will see on stage. A fellow actor confided to me recently

that one of the attractions of being involved in theatre is the galaxy of personalities we always encounter, and (without giving anything away) that is certainly true of this cast and crew.

Director Ron Moore runs a tight ship, while always flexible and open to suggestions and alternatives - in summary, cruel but fair. The warm-up sessions prior to each rehearsal are a novelty for me as a new member of CTC, but certainly do give us a focus on the job at hand and

promote collegiality. New also for me has been the task of preparing my character's back-story (and well-guarded secret) – although it is the sort of thing I have done informally for past productions as preparation for a role.

I was most impressed with the standard of 'Playhouse Creatures' in 2014, and am relishing the challenges of my part in what should be a very watchable production of 'Cosi' in 2015."


Who knows what we will uncover during our next sortie into the CTC time vault. I can hardly wait!

CTC Playwright member writes a winning play!

'The Last Three Blondes' - 'Best Play' Sydney Crash Test Drama Final!

Phillip McDonald's play The Last Three Blondes as reported in the Winter edition of Headliner received the Judges Award at Melbourne Crash Test Drama back in May. Well, after a rewrite Phillip took his play to compete in the Sydney CTD Heats in October. An added bonus this time Phillip had Alex Broun (world leading ten minute playwright) as his director, and a talented cast of actors to compete against more seasoned writers in 'ten minute play central' Sydney. Thanks to Alex's stunning dramaturge, superb acting, and savvy cuts to the script we beat the field. The win put TLTB into the CTD Final. Another flight up to Sydney in December another leg in the development process. This time after one rehearsal still scripts in hand Marilyn M. Grace K. and Princess Diana drew these responses from the audience 'breathtaking, timeless, beautiful' to overwhelm Sydney's best. The industry judge awarded TLTB Best Play because it was a true ten minute play not a skit, and showed and didn't tell. The astounded Phillip cannot believe his dumb luck the win secures the play a spot in the Sydney Short & Sweet Short Play Festival in February to receive a full production. Hard work and dumb luck are a curious mix Phillip's seven year Short & Sweet dreams have come true.

Now we compete on the biggest short play stage of all; but armed with a Best Play, a Best Director, a Best Actress and a Best Runner-up Actress to compete against 80 top worldwide short play scripts out of 500 entrants. I hope the judges like blondes.
